

#### **PROFILES**

CLEM ROLIN, MUSICAL DIRECTOR/PRINCIPAL CONDUCTOR. earned his B. S. in Music Education and Masters of Education from Duquesne University, and served as Director of Bands in both the South Fayette Township and Montour School Districts as well as at Robert Morris University. He began his association with the West Hills Symphonic Band as an instrumentalist during the 1969 season. From that point, he served in periodic roles as arranger, guest/substitute/associate conductor and bassist over a 40-year span. Some of his guest conducting appearances include PMEA District Honors Jazz Bands (2006, 2011, 2012), Washington County Honors Band (2004, 2019), Elementary District Band (2006) and for the World Civic Orchestra at New York's Lincoln Center (2013, 2015). He continues to be a familiar performer on Pittsburgh's jazz scene, and to pen custom arrangements for concert and marching bands. Clem also continues to serve as PMEA adjudicator, clinician and guest jazz soloist for the public schools. He is proud to have many former students number among the ranks of the WHSB.

TOM SNYDER, ASSOCIATE CONDUCTOR, retired in June 2021 to conclude 40 years of public school music teaching, almost all at West Allegheny. He served in many roles throughout his tenure, including as the K–12 Arts Coordinator, high school musical producer, stage manager, and band director, middle school music teacher, and elementary instrumental lessons teacher. He is continuing at WA in retirement as an assistant producer with the fall and and spring musicals. Snyder graduated from Clarion State College with a B. S. in Music Education and received a Master's in Music Education from Duquesne University. He is currently the State Music Performance Assessment Coordinator for the PA Music Educators Association (PMEA), and a concert band adjudicator.

JAMIE KASPER, FLUTE SOLOIST, grew up in rural northwestern Pennsylvania and decided she wanted to play the flute when she was nine years old. Her grandmother bought a flute for Christmas that year, and with the help of books and a 1980s tape recorder, Jamie taught herself to play. She majored in music at Indiana University of Pennsylvania and started her career as a music educator, working in schools in Maryland and Virginia before returning home to Pennsylvania in 2002. Jamie currently works as the director of the Arts Education Partnership, a national organization working on arts education policy and research. When she's not monitoring education policy, traveling for work, or playing the flute, she enjoys reading, gardening, and hiking.

#### **PROGRAM NOTES**

Joyce's 71st Regiment March Boyer/arr. Barnes

Joyce's 71st was one of several famous 19th century regimental bands in New York along with others such as the 22nd, led by the legendary conductor, Patrick Gilmore. This march was written for the 71st in 1881 by director, composer, and arranger Thornton Barnes Boyer (1856–1936). The "Joyce" referenced in the march's title is Thomas Joyce, who founded the 71st Regiment's wind band after the unit became part of the NY National Guard after the Civil War. It became his most famous composition with a dramatic opening and a flowing second strain conveying great dignity and pomp.

#### Freefall Robert Sheldon

Commissioned for the 40th anniversary of the Southwest Community Concert Band, this technical juggernaut imagines the thrill of skydiving, replete with moments of spinning, whirling, gliding, floating, trepidation, anticipation, peace and joy. It's variety of ascending and descending lines within an ever-present sense of rhythm provides an intense sense of energy throughout, tempered only by a contrasting, contemplative middle section. Robert Sheldon (b. 1954) is known for composing outstanding music for elementary through professional bands. He had a long teaching career in the public schools and at Florida State University followed by 17 years directing concert band publications at Alfred Music. He now maintains an active composition and conducting schedule, regularly accepting commissions for new works. Sheldon relays that while the actual act of skydiving terrifies him, writing this piece is as close as he plans to get to that experience but has been incredibly enjoyable.

Intermezzo from 'Cavalleria Rusticana' Mascagni/arr. Phillips Pietro Mascagni (1863–1945) was an Italian composer and conductor primarily known for his operas. His most famous piece was written in 1890 at the age of 27, the masterpiece Cavalleria rusticana (Rustic Chivalry), that helped launch the verismo movement of the late 1800s and early 1900s in Italy. From the Italian "vero" or "true," works in this style depicted a more realistic dramatization of everyday life that audiences could easily identify, rather than the caricatures typical of Romantic opera. The most popular surviving musical fragment is the tender, melancholy Intermezzo, an orchestra interlude that occurs between the two scenes of the opera's single act. It has been used in the soundtrack of several films, including Martin Scorsese's Raging Bull, The Godfather, Part

III and the HBO series The Sopranos.

Concertino, Op. 107 Cécile Chaminade/arr. Clayton Wilson The Flute Concertino in D major, Op. 107, is a concertino composed in 1902 by Cécile Louise Stéphanie Chaminade (1857–1944), a French composer and pianist. In 1913, she was awarded the Légion d'Honneur, a first for a female composer. Originally written for flute and piano, Chaminade later arranged it for flute and orchestra with several transcriptions following for band. It was commissioned by the Paris Conservatoire, presumably as an examination piece for flute students. Among flutists, legend has it that she composed this piece to punish a flute-playing lover after he left her to marry someone else, wanting to make a piece so fiendishly difficult that he could not play it (though he supposedly did manage). The piece remains a standard of the flute repertoire with a memorable melodic theme while testing the soloist through the unending phrases, virtuosic flourishes, and the resultant nimble finger work required.

Selections from 'Wicked' Stephen Schwartz/arr. Jay Bocook With music and lyrics by Stephen Schwartz and a book by Winnie Holzman, Wicked is a loose adaptation of the 1995 Gregory Maguire novel Wicked: The Life and Times of the Wicked Witch of the West that was based on L. Frank Baum's 1900 novel The Wonderful Wizard of Oz and its classic 1939 film adaptation. The original Broadway production opened in 2003, winning three Tony Awards with its original cast album earning a Grammy Award. The first part of the two-part film adaptation was just released in November 2024, an ongoing critical and commercial success. The second part will be released on November 21, 2025. Stephen Schwartz (b. 1948) is an American musical theater composer and lyricist. Within his 50+ year career, his hit musicals also include Godspell (1971) and Pippin (1972) along with lyrics to many successful films. His accolades include three Grammy Awards, three Academy Awards, a Golden Globe Award, and six Tony Award nominations.

#### Fanfare Hayabusa Satoshi Yagisawa

Hayabusa, Japanese for "Peregrine falcon," was a robotic spacecraft developed by the Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency to investigate a small near-Earth asteroid named 25143 Itokawa. It was launched in 2003 and rendezvoused with the asteroid in 2005 to study its shape, spin, topography, color, composition, density, and history. It became the first spacecraft to obtain surface samples from an asteroid, returning to Earth in 2010. This fanfare was commissioned by the band of NEC Tamagawa

to commemorate the mission's extraordinary success and was premiered in Tokyo later in 2010. Satoshi Yagisawa (b. 1975) is a Japanese composer, music researcher, and author with bachelor's and master's degrees from the Musashino Academy of Music. His wide range of compositions include pieces for orchestra, band, chamber ensembles, choruses, and traditional Japanese instruments.

J. Ferdinand Herold/trans. V.F. Safranek Zampa Overture Zampa ou La Fiancée de marbre (Zampa, or the Marble Bride) is an opéra comique in three acts by French composer Ferdinand Hérold (1791-1833), with a libretto by Mélesville. Premiered in 1831, it combined the spirit of Italian music with the depth of German drama and the elegance of the French style. The character of Zampa was a notorious, evil pirate captain who, during a drinking bout with fellow pirates, puts a bridal ring on the finger of a marble statue representing the woman who had rejected him. It became popular throughout most of Europe with its U.S. premiere in 1833 before fading from the repertoire by the mid-1900s. However, its overture is one of Hérold's most famous works and has become a staple of the orchestral repertoire along with the band transcription published in 1912 by V.F. Safranek (1867–1955). Its melodies are catchy and expressive with dramatic mood contrasts, concluding with an exhilarating finale. Herold died at the age of 42 from tuberculosis but remains celebrated for his 20+ operas and ballets, piano music and choral pieces. Safranek is well known for expanding the typical "military" band instrumentation from being based on brass bands with token reed parts added as flourishes or to double brass parts to one that thoughtfully includes woodwinds woven within his many arrangements and orchestra transcriptions.

#### Hope Stijn Aertgeerts

Stijn Aertgeerts (b. 1992) is a Dutch composer who started flugelhorn lessons at age 6. He added cornet and continued his studies at the Royal Conservatory of Antwerp and at the Royal Conservatory of Brussels with a master's degree on tuba along with studying composition and conducting. He played cornet with several prestigious youth brass bands and continues to play, now on tuba, with Brass Band Willebroek, other wind ensembles, and professional symphony orchestras. As a composer, Stijn actively writes for brass band, concert band and fanfare orchestra. About *Hope*, he writes: "In the troubled world we live in these days, it is hard to stay positive. It seems like the hate just keeps spreading in the world and it makes you feel helpless. It's more important than ever to

fight that hate with hope and love, believing in humanity to come out stronger than everything that drives us apart. We need to keep hoping and working towards that better world we all want." We are dedicating our performance today to the victims of the LA fires along with the brave first responders continuing the battle even as we perform and to all involved in providing them with "hope."

#### Cole Porter on Broadway arr. Warren Barker

Cole Porter (1891–1964) was an American composer who became one of the great songwriters of the 20th century. Born to a wealthy family in Indiana, Porter defied his grandfather's wishes for him to practice law and took up music as a profession. Classically trained, he was drawn to musical theater. After a slow start, he began to achieve success in the 1920s and by the 1930s was one of the leading songwriters for the Broadway stage. Unlike many successful Broadway composers, Porter wrote the lyrics as well as the music for his songs, lyrics that became as distinctive as his music. His most successful musical, Kiss Me, Kate. It won the first Tony Award for Best Musical in 1948. Legendary arranger Warren Barker (1923-2006) has melded nine of Porter's tunes from that period within this delightful medley. Porter's 1934 musical Anything Goes featured Ethel Merman. Porter's lyrics were clever, funny, and romantic with great nuances. Amorous situations were topics in "You Do Something to Me" (1929), "Let's Do It (Let's Fall In Love)" (1928), and "What Is This Thing Called Love?" (1929). The musical Anything Goes also featured one of Porter's famous "list" songs, "You're the Top," with more than 60 comparisons to people, places, and things. "Just One of Those Things" was a lucky survivor of the 1935 musical Jubilee that ran for just 169 performances. The lyrics to "Love for Sale" were considered too explicit for radio broadcast in 1930, granting it instant notoriety. In his last Broadway show, The Gay Divorce, Fred Astaire sang "Night and Day." It became one of Porter's most recorded songs. This medley fittingly concludes with "Blow, Gabriel, Blow" from Anything Goes.

El Cumbanchero Rafael Hernandez/arr. Naohiro Iwai Rafael Hernández Marín (1892–1965) was a Puerto Rican songwriter and the author of hundreds of popular songs in the Latin American repertoire. He specialized in Cuban styles, such as the canción, bolero and guaracha. The fiery, flashy "El Cumbanchero" is among his most famous compositions. Naohiro Iwai (1923–2014), was a Japanese composer, arranger and conductor known as a prolific arranger with over

5,000 pieces for concert bands, brass bands, and small ensembles. In his writing, he prioritized developing quality pop music arrangements. He was also active throughout Japan as a conductor, adjudicator, and clinician, all as a powerful advocate for music education.
